President's Report



Toodyay has been chosen as the winner of the 2014 WA State Tidy Towns Sustainable Communities award, announced on 21 November by Environmental Minister

Albert Jacob. Mr Jacob said that Toodyay ticked boxes in all judging categories ranging from general appearance, to waste management, litter prevention, water conservation and energy innovation. Congratulations to the Toodyay Tidy Towns Committee for their innovative and enthusiastic drive that has encouraged the wonderful efforts of 870 volunteers contributing an estimated 14400 hours to projects throughout the last year.

Bush fire mitigation work around the Toodyay townsite has now been completed. Basically this work comprised heavy duty slashing of portions of Pelham reserve adjoining the townsite, areas adjacent to the Toodyay District high school, portion of the old railway reserve in Toodyay Street and targeted areas of the river reserve within the town, through to Leeder Street in the old West Toodyay townsite. While there is no doubt that this mitigation work has the potential to reduce the intensity of a bush fire, it is not a preventative measure. Obviously residents still need to ensure that their properties are fire safe. A fire adjacent to Sandplain Road on November 10, on a property that was completely destroyed during the disastrous 2009 bushfire, is a reminder of how quickly previously gutted areas can regenerate dangerous fuel loads. There has been quite a lot of discussion recently on the actual numbers of active and available firefighters within our Shire. Although the numbers have been revised downward from previously published statistics it is important to acknowledge the availability of up to fifty private units, mostly farmer owned, that often assist with bushfire control.

On Saturday 22 November, Councillors and the CEO attended a community meeting at Morangup to discuss residents' concerns relative to a proposal by BRL and BAJV to mine Bauxite in the Morangup area. This well attended meeting was an opportunity for elected members to obtain a better understanding of the possible detrimental effects that this proposed mining venture may have on nearby residents. It was also an opportunity for Council to respond to the many comments and questions being asked regarding Council's current and future involvement with the project proponents and to also clarify the constraints imposed upon Council's powers by the Mining Act. I reiterate that Council continues to maintain a neutral stance, neither supporting nor opposing Bauxite mining and that we do not have access to any information or data that is not already in the public domain. I thank the organisers and attendees for their civil and courteous attitude throughout the afternoon and for their hospitality at the conclusion of the meeting.

The Shire of Toodyay has received an application from Vernice Pty Ltd for an extractive industry at Lot 1 Goomalling Toodyay Road (corner Forrest Road), Nunile.

The applicant is seeking approval to remove gravel and sand materials for building and construction purposes from an area on the property of approximately 6 hectares. It is expected that an average of 8,000m³ of gravel and 3,000m³ of sand is to be excavated per year. The anticipated duration of the extraction program is approximately ten years.

Free x-rays available for women over 40

FREE X-RAYS to detect breast cancer will be available in Toodyay at a mobile unit at the Toodyay Medical Centre, 81 Stirling Terrace, from December 4-22.

BreastScreen WA is urging all local women 40 years or older to book a free mammogram by calling 132 050.

The distinctive white and pink BreastScreen WA van will be parked in the medical centre car park.

The Toodyay visit is part of a national program to encourage all Australian women aged 40 and over to have a free mammogram check every two years.

BreastScreen WA Medical Director Dr Elizabeth Wylie said two-year screening increased the chance of breast cancer being detected if it was too small to feel or be noticed.


"Breast screening saves lives and takes only 20 minutes," Dr Wylie said."It significantly increases the chances of a woman surviving breast cancer and reduces the amount of treatment required.

"Finding a cancer at this early stage often means that it is small and more treatable.

"Mammograms may detect up to 90 percent of breast cancers."

Dr Wylie said more than 75 percent of breast cancers occurred in women older than 50 years.

Any woman with a persistent change in her breast should see a doctor immediately.

Dogs need blood too

Heartlands Vet Hospital Dr Astrid King

MOST people know about annual Red Cross appeals for people to donate blood to save human lives but many dog owners may not realise that canine blood donors are also needed.

Heartlands Vet Hospital often uses donated canine blood to save the lives of dogs with life-threatening conditions such as rat bait poisoning and snake bites.

This year, we have successfully treated and saved more than 20 dogs with bleeding disorders.

Our dog blood donors are usually staff members' pets.

Dogs, however, can only donate blood safely once every 3-6 months, so demand is increasing.

We are hoping to find more local dog owners in Toodyay whose pets are available and willing to donate blood in an emergency situation.

If you are interested in adding your dog's name to our donor list, it must meet the following criteria:

- over 25kg;
- 1-8 years old;
- fit and healthy;
- up-to-date with vaccinations;
- sterilised and never pregnant if female; and
- never received a blood or plasma transfusion in the past.

Donating blood takes no more than an hour and simply involves your dog being lightly sedated.

Afterwards, your dog is given a mandatory 'cup of tea and a biscuit' in the form of Advanced Puppy Food.

Blood donations ensure our canine patients are given the very best chance of surviving their ordeal.

Each dog blood donor receives a free vet check, a free bag of Advance Premium Dog food and has its photo pinned on our notice



board, along with the owner's reward of helping to save the life of a loved pet.

Whole-person care

In Wellness News (Spring 2014), Cancer Support WA CEO Mandy BeckerKnox described the model of whole-person care known as integrative medicine as a much more comprehensive and holistic healthcare model in which a personalised and comprehensive approach encompasses the treatment and care of the whole person. This means every aspect of a person's health and well-being – including 'physical, emotional, and spiritual needs' – is considered by their primary-care team. Health care, despite its medical and technical basis, is most effective when person-centredness based upon human interaction is at its heart. "The focus of the review will be to assess the efficiency and effectiveness of programs and services in supporting individuals experiencing mental ill health, their families and other support people so they can lead a contributing life and to engage productively in the community."

THE National Mental Health Commission has been labouring away all year on yet another report on mental health in Australia.

In the meantime, despite a library overflowing with reports, Senate inquiries etc., the Federal Government has washed its hands of mental health reform pending its own commissioned report.

The following is from the Commission's website:

"This review is examining existing mental health services and programs across all • tackling issues of stigma and discrimination which can include removing narrow technological approaches, including psychiatric diagnosis and its damaging effects. The widespread use of the term 'mental illness' – even by organisations advocating for change – must be abandoned.

In primary care in particular, a truly patientcentred approach that does not medicalise problems of living can help to restore meaning, a sense of personal control, and hope for the future.

'REWARD for Effort' is essential for everyone's well-being.

December is a good time to reflect on the past year and to start planning for 2015.

After a busy period such as a harvest or simply as an 'annual weighing up' before Christmas, conducting a review with yourself and/or your team is good for wellbeing.

Florentines need to be watched carefully

FLORENTINES look difficult to make but they are not. However, because they have condensed milk in the ingredients, which binds the mixture, watch them carefully to prevent burning.

Florentines can also be packed to make an interesting and delicious gift. Ingredients:

2 cups crushed cornflakes

 $\frac{3}{4}$ cup sultanas ³/₄ cup raw peanuts, halved

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup chopped cherries $\frac{1}{2}$ can condensed milk

85gms dark chocolate, coarsely chopped Method:

Line a flat tray with baking paper and very lightly sprinkle with cornflour; shake the trays to remove any excess cornflour.

Set the dark chocolate aside. Mix the remaining ingredients well.

Place small spoonfuls on the baking paper

covered trays.

Bake in a moderate oven of 180°c or 160°C fan-forced for 15 to 20 minutes. Observe

carefully to prevent burning. Leave on the tray to cool then lift very gently with a spatula turning the roughened side downwards.

Store in an airtight container in the fridge.

PLANT DESCRIPTION

Skeleton Weed (Chondrilla Juncea) flowers from December through to April and seeds during this time as well. It is a wiry plant that is hairless apart from stiff bristles at the base of the plant.

The rosette starts growing in October and dies off once the plant has "run up" (the stem has grown).



New plants can grow from October to April after rain.

Escapee leaves trail of destruction

Weed of the month **Jacqueline Lucas**

I HAVE very fond childhood memories of picking blackberries in Victoria and turning them into jam.

As I grew older I learnt to appreciate that this plant is a horrific weed, taking over agricultural land and remnant bushland, and making wonderful dens for foxes and rabbits.

There are five types of blackberries found in WA.

The variety of blackberry found in the Toodyay area is Rubus laudatus, or 'early blackberry'

This particular species comes from North America and – once again – is a garden escapee

It grows to 3m high as a rambling shrub with long, thorny arching canes.

Early blackberries have pure white flowers that bloom September to November, with fruit that tends to be produced in December.

Each set of flowers produces 3-12 berries containing many seeds.

Blackberries will grow across a wide range of soil types, from sand to gravelly loam and granite.

The plant prefers low flats along watercourses, streams, swamps and roadsides

Some species have difficulty emerging from heavy leaf litter and prefer disturbed soil sites but it is not known if the early blackberry is one of these.

The blackberry is such a virile weed because it has several forms of reproduction.

It can grow by seed when the fruit is consumed by birds, foxes and other mammals and spread via their droppings.

It can also grow vegetatively from cuttings such as garden waste.

In addition, blackberries have a strong root suckering system that enables the plant to easily re-grow when upper parts are damaged.

This poses a real challenge for blackberry control and requires combined methods of weed control.

Blackberries occupy about nine million hectares of land in Australia and their vigorous growth enables them to infest large areas quite quickly.

Economic impacts of blackberries include:

reduced available grazing land;

These pest species also disperse blackberry seed, acting as vectors that spread blackberry infestations.

Dead blackberry plants increase the risk of bush fires and obstruct access to fire trails and water for controlling fires.

- On the positive side, blackberries produce: • fruit that can be eaten and sold;
- flowers that produce nectar for bees to make honey;
- leaves that can be used to make herbal

Five Mop Top Robinias provided an exquisite canopy for a tranquil shady area under which we had our morning tea.


An aviary, small lake and water features were among other attractions.

Secretive hunter lies in wait to ambush prey

Brown Goshawk

Bird of the Month Desraé Clarke

OVER the past months, a pair of Brown Goshawks have made their presence heard with raucous calling and have been observed drinking at our bird baths or resting in nearby trees.

They are a mid-sized 'bird of prey' with the female of 55cms and wingspan of up to 96cms, and the much smaller male of 40cms with a wingspan of up 74cms.

The male and female are similar in colouring and markings although the fine rufous-coloured markings over the white underparts of the female are a tad coarser.

The Brown Goshawk is an easily identified species with its bright yellow eyes and long yellow legs.

It has a rufous collar, powdery grey-brown upper parts, white with rufous barring underparts and a barred, rounded tail observed when gliding on slightly upswept wings.

The Brown Goshawk builds a flattish nest of sticks high in a living tree and lines its nest with fresh, green leaves.

It reaches sexual maturity at twelve months of age with breeding from approximately July to December. They lay two to four eggs which are incubated for approximately thirty days by the female bird

The young hatchlings are initially white down and become a salmon-brown colour within about seven days and independent within about six weeks. While brooding the parents aggressively defend the nest area.

The Brown Goshawk is quite a secretive bird with the hunting ploy of sitting concealed in a tree to suddenly dash to catch either moving or unmoving prey of rabbits, reptiles, frogs, birds and, occasionally, carrion.

It is a common bird within our Shire being found in both bushland and open farmland.

The male birds call is a rapid 'ki, ki, ki,' whereas the female has a mellower and

deeper call of 'yuik, yuik, yuik'. Terry High, of Gidgegannup 0408 918

272, specialises in caring and rehabilitating injured or orphaned 'birds of prey' such as goshawks, owls, eagles, falcons, etc.

Colourful, harmless local

Southern Shovel-nosed or Half-girdled Snake

Python Watch

THERE have been several reports of sightings within our Shire of a small harmless snake, the Southern Shovel-nosed or Half-girdled Snake which grows to a length of 36cms.

The top mandible of this small reptile protrudes, therefore the name 'shovelnosed', and contains a cutting edge 'tooth' which it uses to break into reptile eggs, its exclusive diet.

The Southern Shovel-nosed Snake is throughout our Shire in found terrains as it lives in termite nests, beneath logs and rocks, insect holes and under rubbish. It lays three to five eggs in early summer Its ground colour ranges from orange to gold to reddish-brown with brown, occasionally irregular, bandings; however, occasionally a whitish ground colour is found

The bandings do not completely encircle the body; the belly colouring is a cream to white.

It has a broad band across the snout to include the eye, slightly broader banding on the neck and narrow bandings along the body including the tail.

As Christmas is fast approaching a lovely gift could be 'A Field Guide of the Reptiles and Frogs of the Perth Region' or 'Reptiles and Frogs in the Bush: Southwestern Australia² with both publications by Brian Bush, Brad Maryan, Robert-Browne-Cooper and David Robinson.
