#### **Oral History Focus Day on the way**

On Saturday April 29, as part of The National Trust's Australian Heritage Festival, the Shire and the Toodyay Historical Society are hosting an Oral History Focus Day at two venues - Connor's Mill and Drummond House (next to the Bendigo Bank) - between 9.00am and 4.00pm.

Oral histories capture stories for generations to come. At Connor's Mill, listen to apiarist Sam Cook's recorded stories about his family's beekeeping activities during the 1930s-1950s, from an oral history undertaken in 1994. At Drummond House (Toodyay Environment & History Centre), the Historical Society's experienced oral historians will host informal chat sessions encouraging local folk to share their own memories.

#### **Local Planning Scheme No.5** adopted for submission

At a Special Council Meeting held on Wednesday March 29, Council adopted proposed Local Planning Scheme No. 5 for submission to the Western Australian Planning Commission, with a request for final approval by the Minister for Planning.

Local Planning Scheme No. 4 was adopted in 2008, with schemes normally reviewed every ten years. In 2017 Council resolved to prepare the Shire of Toodyay Local Planning Scheme No. 5 (LPS5). While the process for the development of a new scheme is complex, changes in elected members, staff turnover, and concerns regarding the original draft LPS5 resulted in delays to the completion of the final draft.

"This has been a long and arduous process with many factors contributing to the delays," said Shire President, Cr Rosemary Madacsi. "I take this opportunity to thank and congratulate my fellow Councillors and the Shire staff for their commitment to this process and also those in the community who have contributed. We look forward to working together on the Scheme Amendment and our next job; a review of the Shire's Local Planning Strategy".

#### **Results of Land Auction,** 18 March 2023

The previously advertised 10-acre bush block at Lot 17 Toodyay Road was sold at auction on 18 March 2023 for \$125,000. This was sufficient for the recovery of outstanding rates, with a considerable surplus for the family members of the previous owner. Congratulations to the purchaser - we look forward to the development of the property, which has been resting for several decades.

#### Local health care back in business: Shire acquires **GP services for Toodyay**

Alma Beard Medical Centre will once again take care of the community's health and wellbeing, with a contract for the provision of GP and allied health services endorsed by Council at the Ordinary Council Meeting on March 22, and signed by Shire CEO Suzie Haslehurst, incoming GP Dr Akeem Lawal, and Shire President Cr Rosemary Madacsi on March 23.

Since the centre's closure in November last year, the Shire has focused firmly on acquiring new services to fill the space. Dr Lawal, who has previously worked locally and is no stranger to

many Toodyay residents seeking high-quality health care, will take over the practice following a comprehensive tender process and contract negotiations. "I am keen to reconnect with my existing patients and of course, welcome new ones," Dr Lawal said at the signing.

The Shire and Dr Lawal will work together to ensure Alma Beard reopens as a general practice as soon as possible. Services are expected to resume in late May, once all required resources are secured and setup is complete.

#### Protect yourself against mosquito-borne diseases

Japanese encephalitis virus (JEV) has recently been detected for the first time in the Northern Kimberly region of WA. JEV is a mosquitoborne disease that affects both humans and animals, infecting humans/horses as dead-end hosts and pigs/birds as hosts that can amplify and retransmit the infection through mosquitoes.

JEV activity was identified via several Department of Health surveillance programs. These act as early warning systems for mosquito-borne diseases, as part of a broader JEV-enhanced monitoring response following the outbreak of Japanese encephalitis (JE) in other Australian states/territories. JE is a vaccine-preventable disease in people, and WA Health has begun vaccinating residents living in remote areas of the northern Kimberley who may be at risk. Lower your own risk by taking precautions to avoid mosquito bites, which can also protect you from other mosquito-borne infections without vaccines (including Murray Valley encephalitis).

Protect yourself: Cover up when outside, particularly at dawn and dusk; apply repellent regularly to all exposed skin; and use mosquito nets where necessary.

Reduce mosquitoes in and around your home: Keep grass cut and plants trimmed; apply residual surface spray to outdoor walls/patios etc; keep your property clear of water-holding rubbish; regularly clean and refill bird baths/stock troughs etc; keep roof gutters clear to prevent pooling; ensure swimming pools are properly cleaned and chlorinated; install and maintain insect screens; and use mosquito coils/lanterns.

Farm/large rural property advice: Keep dams free of vegetation and check dam walls for leaks; avoid over-irrigation; and protect horses using a hooded rug, fly mask, and repellent.

Report suspected signs of JEV infection in animals: Contact your local vet or call the Emergency Animal Disease Watch Hotline on 1800 675 888.

#### Making a sustainable Shire-wide splash

The Shire has received a \$73,897 grant from the WA Government's Community Water Supplies Partnership Program. This program is jointly funded by the State Government and the Commonwealth Government's National Water Grid Connections Funding Program, and we plan to put our portion to good use: utilising the Toodyay Recreation Centre precinct roof and haskethall courts to maximise stormwater harvest for irrigation and firefighting.

We have also been re-endorsed and recognised as a Waterwise Council for 2023 by the Water Corporation. This comes as part of the Waterwise Council Program, which supports councils in improving water efficiency and adopting waterwise practices in their operations and communities. Thank you to



everyone who has helped us achieve and maintain sustainable water management in the Shire.

Finally, a new water tank has been installed by volunteers at Morangup Community Hall, having been fully grant-funded to the value of \$15,000. The 27-kilolitre tank was supplied by Hills Concrete Pty Ltd, Northam.

#### Have permits and notifications on hand during the Restricted **Burning Period**

The Shire is now in the Restricted Burning Period. Permits are required for any burning activity, and are currently only being issued for stubble and chaff burning for crop preparation purposes. Permits will not be issued for burning timber piles or for social events. All permit applications must be made via the Shire website, and permit holders must comply with all permit conditions - including (but not limited to) restrictions/requirements around burn notifications, minimum supervision, and firefighting resources.

During the Restricted Burning Period, the Shire will issue permits for bona fide broad acre stubble operations for a period of up to 28 days, to reduce re-application requirements for farmers with large operations. Please be advised that the Restricted Burning Period may be extended beyond April 30 dependent on weather conditions.

Please check the Shire website regularly to stay up to date with current burning periods. Any changes will also be advised via our Harvest, Vehicle Movement and Hot Works Ban SMS System – a vital tool if you live in the Toodyay district. This system notifies you of the start/end of and any extensions to both Hot Works Bans and Restricted/Prohibited Burning Periods. To register, message BANS to 0408 017 439.

Please note that the SMS notification system is not an emergency warning system.

## Julimar Forest wildlife decline points to future extinctions

MORE than 50 members of the Toodyay community attended the "Catchments, Carnabies and Chuditch of the Julimar Forest" forum at the Toodyay Community Pavilion last month.

Chittering Landcare Group community rivercare officer Dr Liz Kington spoke about how the Julimar Forest contributes to the Brockman River and Julimar Brook catchments which ultimately feed into the Avon and Swan rivers.

Although Julimar Brook only flows for part of the year, its water quality was such that it was considered a potential source for Perth in the early 2000s.

In his comprehensive talk on the black cockatoos of Western Australia, WA Museum curator of ornithology Ron Johnston noted a worrying decline in all three black cockatoo species due to the loss of traditional food sources and nesting hollows.

Ron, who has been researching the cockatoo species since 1979, estimates 54 per cent of suitable nesting sites are being lost per decade.

The survival of each of the three black cockatoo species is dependent on access to trees at least 250 years old, as well as fresh

The Bindoon Training Area and adjacent Julimar Forest provide a major breeding ground for the endangered Carnaby's cockatoo, which competes with feral bees and galahs for nesting hollows.

Numbers of the critically endangered Baudin's cockatoo, which was recently recorded in Julimar, are likely to be less than 10,000 within 10 years.

At this rate of decline it will be extinct within 50 years.

The last speaker at the forum was Shire of Toodyay reserves management officer and local resident Greg Warburton.

Greg spoke about WA's largest marsupial carnivore, the chuditch, Dasyurus geoffroii, easily identified by its distinctive white spots.

This solitary, nocturnal hunter is equally at home on the ground or in trees.

The territorial males will forage areas of up to 15sqkm and can weigh up to 2kg.

The chuditch population has declined to such an extent that it is listed as a threatened

Also known as the Western quoll, the chuditch previously inhabited areas across inland Australia, but is now confined to parts of the South West, with the Julimar forest one of its last strongholds.

The Department of Conservation and Land Management successfully introduced specimens bred in captivity to the forest 30 years ago in a bid to conserve the species.

The Toodyay Friends of the River thank the forum speakers for their excellent talks.

In accordance with the Privacy Act 1988, name and contact details are collected, stored, and are never shared with Chalice or connected to survey responses. The demographic details (e.g. age, gender) collected are important to ensure the sample is diverse and robust.

Local Voices provides more than a platform for people to have a say, it also supports local community groups through the Community Rewards Program. In recognition of people's time and effort taken to complete an 'Anchor' survey, an optional \$10 donation can be awarded to a local community group of the participant's choice, irrespective of people's views towards Chalice and or mining.

# Parliamentary petition rejected but we fight on


Safe and Scenic Toodyay Road Andrew St John

A PETITION signed by more than 5000 people to review planned alterations to Toodyay Road has been rejected by a WA State Parliamentary Committee.

Safe and Scenic Toodyay Roads (SASTR) and local community members campaigned for two years for a sustainable and environmentally responsible road design that would incorporate improved safety measures.

The petition spoke to concerns about the potential loss of wandoo trees up to 400 years old

More than 1250 people from around the Toodyay area signed the petition,

supplemented by more than 4000 signatures online

However, the Standing Committee on Environment and Public Affairs of the Legislative Assembly rejected the petition, citing the lengthy consultations and accommodations made by Main Roads WA (MRWA) and claimed adequate mitigation of environmental effects.

We believe the committee ignored arguments SASTR presented and selectively cited from submissions.

For example, the committee quoted a Shire of Toodyay view that safety was of primary concern, which was never disputed by SASTR.

However, the same letter from the Shire of Toodyay chief executive indicated a review of the plans was justified to reduce the long-term cost to the environment without compromising road safety objectives.

compromising road safety objectives.

This "selective hearing" does not instil confidence that the committee looked at submissions objectively, but instead gave preference to those in favour of the planned improvements.

The result is perhaps unsurprising given far more egregious assaults on our environment are receiving approval based on lax environmental regulations.

Despite the setback SASTR intends to continue fighting and seek further changes to the road plans.

MRWA representatives will conduct a walk-through in early April to show planned changes at the Salt Valley and Sandplain Road junction.

This should provide a clearer picture of how much vegetation will be lost and the impact of reducing the cutting depth from 12 to six metres, which MRWA finally agreed to last year.

Hopefully the walk-through will reveal

old-growth wandoo trees that will not now be mulched as part of the roadworks.

SASTR is pleased to have achieved this major change given MRWA previously stated a 12-metre cutting was a minimum for line-of-sight at the junction.

When a seemingly immutable engineering requirement is subsequently overturned it casts doubt on other MRWA claims used to

justify widespread clearing.

While the written petition is no longer available, SASTR's campaign will continue.

Other means of registering dissatisfaction with the road improvements will be announced soon.

# More shire powers needed to eliminate feral cats

FERAL cats pose the biggest threat to wildlife in Australia, killing an estimated 75 million native animals every day.

This was the key message at a recent national feral cat symposium in Perth, attended by 250 experts and visitors from all Australian states and New Zealand.

Speakers included leading genetic scientists and Aboriginal rangers from the Western Desert.

To save Australia's threatened native fauna from the devastating impact of feral cats, experts say flexibility, pragmatism, and persistence are needed.

To control or eliminate feral cats, our community must have the appetite for it and get the public onside.

A Feral Cat Working Group needs to be formed within the Shire of Toodyay to create a workable plan.

WA's existing cat laws do not give local government power for effective action.

Many local shires and councils are calling for new cat laws like those for dogs, which require owners to restrict their pets to their own properties.

While cat control laws are due for review next year, changes are unlikely to come into effect before 2025.

Other solutions currently being trialled include trapping using artificial intelligence (AI) in cage and spray traps to target feral cats without endangering native animals.

Murdoch University wildlife biologist Trish Fleming and her research team were trialling a trap that will only spring shut when a cat is identified.

Queensland Parks and Wildlife rangers are trialling a 'Felixer', which uses AI, laser light and rangefinder sensors to identify feral animals and spray them with 1080 poison.

Native animals are immune to the spray, but it will kill feral animals when licked from fur. These traps have a proven success rate of

50-80 per cent, which developers are working to improve

to improve.
Additionally, scientists are exploring genetic controls, such as genetically modifying female cats to produce only males, or rendering them genetically infertile.

Another tool is FeralScan, a free mobile phone app that maps feral cat sightings, recording their impact on native species and documenting where controls are in place.

Steps can be taken to eliminate ferals once a pattern of sightings is recorded.

We do not have to remove hundreds of cats to make a difference.

Cats are such highly mobile, instinctive killers that removing just one can make a big difference.

Peel-Harvey Catchment Council Farmers For Fauna coordinator Christine Townsend reported on a neighbourhood approach to protect numbats in the Dryandra woodland near Cuballing.

This involved getting surrounding farms to join a coordinated cat management program.

A similar project could work successfully with farms around our Toodyay reserves and the Julimar Conservation Park.

Such a move would pave the way for others to follow and help save our State's endangered native species from extinction.

## Working wonders with the wounded

A VARIETY of animals have been rescued this month.

Firstly, an underweight owlet nightjar was fed high protein meal worms and has since been released.

Bobtails with the flu are still being brought in, so we ask everyone to be on the lookout for these reptiles.

If you find a bobtail with a flat tail, gummed-up eyes, and looking unwell, it needs to come into care immediately.

Without medication and care, they will not survive.

Euro wallabies from the Pilbara are now in care and doing well.

A tawny frogmouth with a broken leg, presumably from being struck by a car, was

x-rayed and is being cared for to see if it heals sufficiently for release. In a good news story, seven months ago Helen called and advised that she had a

possum on her verandah.

I found a furless, cold, tiny possum weighing just 32g.

After four days of being warmed, and fed 0.5ml six times per day, it grew and is now healthy

healthy.

At the Toodyay Markets, our carer Belinda brought the possum along with her, and Helen was able to see how hig it had grown.

Helen was able to see how big it had grown.

There were reportedly a few tears upon introduction.

We are treating injured kangaroos, most likely caused by being caught in a fence.

We dart them, clean the wounds, and apply medical honey, kindly donated by Bonger's Bees.

The honey has been very helpful in healing their wounds.

The sedation drugs we use are expensive, but without them, the kangaroos would be euthanised.

# Draft Local Planning Policy - Extractive Industry and Waste Disposal

At the Ordinary Council Meeting held on 22 March 2023, Council resolved to advertise Draft Local Planning Policy – Extractive Industry and Waste

The objective of the draft policy is to provide guidance for extractive industries and waste disposal operation within the Shire of Toodyay.

This draft policy forms part of a current review of existing local planning policies, seen as an integral part of good governance and designed to clearly define the various levels of consultation required to meet the statutory and 'standard' consultation requirements for a range of Council planning functions.

In the context of this policy, planning proposals include development applications, Local Planning Scheme amendments, Local Planning Strategies, Local Planning Policies, and Structure Plans.

Local Planning Policies are guidelines used to assist the local government in making decisions under the Local Planning Scheme. A Local Planning Policy is not part of the Local Planning Scheme and does not bind the local government to any application for development approval – however, the local government is to have due regard to the provisions of the policy and the objectives which the policy is designed to achieve before making its determination.



OUR ANNUAL Cleanup Australia Day event was held on Saturday March 4 along Julimar Road from the Dawn Atwell Reserve car park.

Volunteers collected 12 bags of litter and various large pieces of trash along a two-kilometre stretch of road.

Much of the litter was made up of coffee and chocolate drink cartons along with drink cars

It is important to note cans are hazardous to wildlife, as evidenced by a previous incident where a skink got its head stuck in one while chasing its prey.

Luckily, a passerby was able to release the reptile using a tin opener.

Our March general meeting featured a presentation by club member and chairperson of the Safe and Scenic Toodyay Road (SASTR) chairperson Dr Andrew St John.

The SASTR campaign has been active for two years now, but unfortunately the WA State Environment Committee rejected their petition calling for a review

of the Toodyay Road improvement plans.

Despite this setback, the campaign continues, and they have achieved some successes including a significant reduction in the depth of the planned cutting at Sandplain and Salt Valley Roads, resulting in less clearing.

Other proposals include prompting Main Roads WA to acknowledge its Community Reference Group has not been successful, resulting in its willingness to keep the public consultation process open.

We anticipate community support for SASTR's actions will only increase when the level of environmental destruction at Sandplain and Salt Valley Roads becomes apparent later this year.

In addition, Fernie Road will undergo work, which involves removing all vegetation on both sides of the road for two kilometres on either side of the junction.

The Nat's next meeting on Saturday April 15 will feature Professor Kingsley Dixon as a special guest and members will receive final details closer to the date.

# Strict penalties may apply if you want to keep wildlife as pets

#### **Python Watch**

Desraé Clarke

PEOPLE often say, "I would love to keep a pet lizard (or python, or turtle, or frog and so on) as a pet."

However, strict rules apply and these should be checked beforehand to avoid significant penalties.

All native flora and fauna are protected in WA, even if a species is not listed as threatened, and regardless of whether it is on Commonwealth land, state-managed Crown land, or private land.

Some native animals, available through the pet industry, can be kept lawfully.

Other native fauna can be kept by licensed persons for education or for wildlife rehabilitation purposes.

The Department of Biodiversity Conservation and Attractions is responsible for the protection and conservation of native fauna in WA, both in the wild and in captivity.

# Chattering bee-eater displays glorious rainbow of colour

Bird of the Month Desraé Clarke

WHAT a wonderful year it has been for sighting the exquisitely coloured rainbow bee-eater.

Numbers have been noticeably up on the past few years.

Noted for its unmistakable chattering, the bee-eater arrives in the Wheatbelt region from northern Australia and beyond in late September and early October.

The migratory species returns to the northern latitudes from late February to mid-March, flying in small groups.

Despite its small size of 21-28cm, the rainbow bee-eater has distinctive 20-40cm long streamers on its tail, which is longer in the male than the female.

Its striking upper-body colouring starts with a blue-green head with an orange crown, fading into yellow-green, then gradually to azure.

It has a long, slightly down-curved dark bill with a broad, black stripe, a black crescent on the throat, and yellowish-green chest colour merging into a blue vent area. It has a red eye, black tail and brown

wings, with greyish legs and feet.

The sun gives the orange underwings a glorious bronze colouring as it wheels

around chasing flying prey of wasps, butterflies, dragonflies, and bees.

Pairs of rainbow bee-eaters appear to return to the same area to build their nests, which are up to 120cm long tunnels dug

banks.

The end of the tunnel is widened and lined with soft grasses.

with their bills and feet in soft soil or river

It lays four to five pearly-white eggs, incubated by both parents for 21-25 days. It will bring prey back to the roosting

area, hitting it hard before eating.







## Blokes are hard-wired to seek help differently

#### **Warrior Wellbeing**

The Regional Men's Health Initiative

AS A BLOKE I am often told to get in touch with my feminine side.

However, this message is becoming part of a language barrier that puts blokes approaches to wellbeing issues in reverse.

In reality, there are three components to our health: physical, mental, and our social/ spiritual wellbeing.

It is in the latter component that we find our sense of identity, individuality and emotional context - not some "feminine side".

While men and women are the same species, we have evolved differently and it is this 0.4 per cent difference in DNA that explains men's warrior attitude towards life and why we seek help differently.

We have identified three main areas of

difference between men and women. Firstly, communication – on average, men

talk one-third as much as women each day (7000 words compared to 21,000)

It is perfectly normal for blokes to talk in dot points or even just grunt.

Secondly, risk-taking – men are hard-wired to take risks from a young age and this is linked to our brain development stage.

As we get older, we get wiser but blokes are still hard-wired to take risks.

Finally, winning – this is an important part of our warrior culture.

The overwhelming majority of Australian men believe that winning is essential and around half think it is all that matters.

These are alarming statistics.

## Good result for 'Bad Intentions' Cody

LOCAL Muay Thai exponent Cody 'Bad Intentions' Lacy has added yet another title to his burgeoning collection of trophies after winning a pre-main event at a Mixed Martial Arts (MMA) cage fight in Northam.

The 17-year-old Toodyay bad boy won in a first round knockout against 18-year-old Northam kickboxer Alex Healey to take the Wheatbelt Regional Super Welterweight

Muay Thai youth title and \$500 purse. Stryka Fight Night II: Riverside Redemption was held at Northam's Riverside Hotel on Saturday March 11.

As the first MMA caged fighting event to be held in the carpark of licenced premises in the Wheatbelt, it drew plenty of attention from local and national media

Northam footy legend and Ballardong man Jermaine 'Bomber' Davis revved up the crowd as ring announcer on a night that kicked off with the youth novice Super

Lightweight kickboxing bout.

This cracker of a fight saw 'Relentless'
Dane Lemin (15) from Stryka Albany take on Stryka Northam's Hayden 'Quick Kickett (15), who is also the first Indigenous fighter from the Wheatbelt to compete in a kickboxing championship.

The result this time around was a points win to Dane, but Stryka coaches Guy and Fi Mead said Hayden had a bright future ahead of him in combat sports if he stayed focused.

The penultimate fight of the evening, Stryka Toodyay champ Cody Lacy against Lana Muay Thai Northam opponent Alex Healey, was a highly anticipated event.

After dominating in the first round with a savage display of relentless aggression Cody was awarded the title via a first-round technical knockout (TKO) after Alex was unable to come out for the second round.


