TOODYAY ROAD UPGRADE

The upgraded section of Toodyay Road between Clackline-Toodyay Road and Northam-Toodyay Road was completed and opened to traffic at the end of May.

Traffic management measures have been removed from the road and the permanent speed limit has been reinstated. We thank the neighbouring landowner, the local community and road users for their patience and support during these works, which, on occasions required the use of shuttle flow traffic management due to construction taking place close to the traffic lanes.

The road in this section has been widened in accordance with Australian Standards for regional roads, with a wide centre line added to increase separation between eastbound and westbound lanes. The works also required the removal of a rock outcrop on the northern side of Toodyay Road to allow for an improvement in the geometry of the road.

Completion of these works is a relatively small but significant milestone as we seek to make the Wheatbelt section of Toodyay Road safer and more efficient for residents, visitors and industry.

Remaining stages to be delivered as a single contract

Some readers may be aware that the overall Toodyay Road Upgrade project between Dryandra Road and Toodyay was initially divided into six smaller sections, as shown in the diagram below.


When this approach was agreed in 2017, Main Roads anticipated the project would be funded in small increments and therefore delivery would take the form of several distinct contracts.

Following a decision by the Commonwealth and State Governments in mid-2021 to fund the entirety of the works, Main Roads has reassessed the project to identify how it can be delivered in the most timely and efficient way.

While Sections 3 (Jingaling Brook) and 6 (Clackline-Toodyay Road to just north of Racecourse Road) have been completed as stand-alone contracts, we now consider that combining the remaining sections of the project into a single large contract would improve efficiency and reduce the risk of inconsistencies and interface challenges between different contractors.

As a result, the Wheatbelt Regional Team is currently liaising with its Perth-based colleagues to determine the appropriate form of contract. We will then enter into a procurement process, which is likely to take around nine months.

As a result, we expect major site works to begin in late 2024, rather than in 2023 as previously

communicated. A construction schedule and works program will be developed by the successful contractor following the award of a contract. At the time of writing we anticipate the entire upgrade between Dryandra Road and Toodyay will be completed in 2026. We will continue to provide updates

as the project progresses.

Main Roads in damage control as costs mount

THE SIGHT of workers sealing broken edges of Toodyay Road has aroused a sense of disbelief in community members including those of us at Safe and Scenic Toodyay Roads.

This is what we have been calling for since we started campaigning two years ago and it is what a Wheatbelt Safety Review recommended back in 2015.

In rejecting such low-cost but effective solutions, Main Roads WA cited the unsuitability of the terrain and a community call for passing lanes.

The apparent change in policy shows that the State Government agency is in damage control in more ways than one.

It recently announced significant delays to planned improvements as ballooning costs quickly become unaffordable.

Given the appalling state of many parts of Toodyay Road, Main Roads knows such action can only further upset the community.

It would mean that Toodyay's main link to Perth would not be fully fixed until more than a decade after the Road Safety Review.

Hence the appearance of contractors providing temporary fixes last month to the busy roadway's most damaged part.

If this prevents accidents in the short term,

before planned major improvements, then all to the good.

But bear in mind these temporary fixes are on parts of the road that will be abandoned, if and when those improvements occur as a result of planned major realignments.

Cheap fixes still cost money and mean that even more public funds are being thrown at an already expensive project.

Imagine if a decision had been taken in 2015 to make the road safer through efficient, low-cost strategies rather than through grand and expensive re-engineering.

The former would have been affordable and almost certainly completed by now, with everyone enjoying the accompanying safety benefits.

Instead, by funding the project as part of an excessive and inflationary post-COVID economic stimulus, the previous Federal Government was complicit in creating the current debacle.

We previously revealed a fundamental flaw

in the State's business case to support the improvements.

It was was based on the supposed economic benefits delivered by people arriving at their destination five minutes earlier by being able to travel at 110km/h on an improved road.

Such economic modelling is more of a possibility than a probability, which is enough to cast doubt on this claim.

enough to cast doubt on this claim.

However, the case for this supposed economic benefit is thoroughly debunked by the fact that the planned speed limit on the rebuilt road will 100km/h – the current maximum speed allowed for most of Toodyay Road.

With mounting costs adding to such a major planning defect, it must surely now be be time for Main Roads to seriously rethink a project that is already years away from completion.

Our ongoing campaign includes asking questions in State Parliament about this increasingly costly project while raising community awareness around its ongoing flaws.

Meanwhile, as work will not begin at the junctions with Sandplain and Salt Valley Roads until at least late next year, we can enjoy the wonderful wandoo woodland and wildflowers there for a little longer.

Stray dogs continue to put wildlife carers at risk

A WILDLIFE carer has been bitten by a dog while trying to protect kangaroos in

Shire of Toodyay rangers impounded the animal before returning it to the owners with hundreds of dollars in fines.

It was not declared a dangerous dog.

This latest attack happened while I was in the June ordinary council meeting asking questions about dog control within the

I excused myself halfway through the meeting to take the call, but made it known another attack had occurred.

Luckily the carer was in her yard when the dog attacked.

Knowing the effects the previous attacks

had on the kangaroos, the carer rang us

Again, two of the kangaroos suffered myopathy, which we treated, but this time the carer was bitten on the arm.

If not for a winter jacket, the injuries

could have been serious.

The Shire says while it recognises stray dogs are a problem in Toodyay, it has taken measures to encourage dog owners to keep their pets within their boundaries.

However the continued attacks would

suggest the measures are not working.

Meanwhile more orphaned joeys are coming in.

I thank members of the public who have contacted us or brought in joeys and birds including corellas and ring-neck parrots.

A pigmy possum (pictured) was brought to us as the result of a cat attack.

Like kangaroos, these possums can stress very badly.

We confirmed it did not have any injuries before releasing it the next day.

Raising funds is an important part of being a wildlife carer.

Don't over water, just hydrate.


Wait until the plant begins to regrow before deciding whether it has been irrevocably damaged.

More protection needed for Julimar's precious orchids

JULIMAR Forest is 28,000ha of beautiful wildflower country with a vast number of species, many of which have not been extensively researched.

A search conducted last year from the former Naturebase, by the Western Australian Herbarium for the Julimar Conservation and Forest Alliance, reported 515 species of plants within a 12km radius of the centre of Julimar.

I have personally found 31 species of orchids in Julimar since I began exploring the area in

A further three species, the red veined shell orchid, slender hammer orchid and star orchid, have been reported to the herbarium, but I have not had the privilege of seeing them in Julimar.

The star orchid, which is listed as nationally threatened, is also within the search area.

Julimar has suitable habitat for this threatened species.

The white china orchid can be found, especially after fire.

I have observed it down the slope from a fire ground, in an unburnt area, suggesting some chemicals from bushfire smoke may trigger its germination.

The yellow china orchid is also found within Julimar.

This species will flower without the need for fire but is more prolific in fire ground areas.

In the spring that followed a December 1997 bushfire there were patches in Julimar where you could barely walk without stepping on either a white or yellow china orchid.

It was a sight I will never forget.

Both the white and yellow china orchids are classified as priority species in need of further

Julimar is a floral wonderland in desperate need of the protection afforded by being declared a national park.

Julimar is a suitable habitat for many more orchid species, such as the blood spider orchid, but it is yet to be thoroughly botanically catalogued.

Rediscovering the work of Gilbert and his potoroo

Toodyay Naturalists' Club Desraé Clarke

THE NAT'S club held its 2023 Annual General Meeting on Saturday July 15.

Sharon Richards was elected president for her third year, along with Desrae Clarke as

secretary and Charmian St John as treasurer.
Following the AGM and General Meeting Greg Warburton gave us an interesting insight into the life of Englishman John Gilbert (1812-

A noted explorer, naturalist and taxidermist, Gilbert spent considerable time in the southwest of the state and in the company of the botanist James Drummond.

He also worked under John Gould, as Gould's principal collector of animal and bird skins, together with plants, to be identified and despatched to England.

Unfortunately, Gilbert is rarely remembered for his work when naming items of natural

However, the small mammal, Gilbert's potoroo (Potorous gilbertii) holds his name.

Feared to be extinct since the early 1900s, the potoroo was rediscovered in 1994 at Two Peoples Bay Nature Reserve near Albany.

In natural history all sorts of odd things can happen, such as finding a white magpie or kangaroo that are not albino, cross-pollinating plants, flora and fauna out of their usual area, and suchlike.

For a second time, photos have been received from community members of a grey kangaroo with two young of the same size in her pouch.

The sightings were several years apart and from different areas of the Shire.

When experts were notified, it was stated that a kangaroo does not have twins.

One wonders.

The next Nat's meeting is to be held Saturday August 19 from 7pm at the Anglican Church Hall, with a presentation of a Landscope research expedition to the Gibson Desert.

The Toodyay Nats are always eager to hear of observations of natural history from community members with the observer recognised in the data held by the Nats.

It is so important to document this information for the future.



You may be eligible to be enrolled to vote in the local government elections on 21 October 2023 if you live in or are an owner or occupier of rateable property in the Shire of Toodyay.

You are automatically enrolled to vote if you are on the State Electoral Roll as at 5:00 PM Friday, 25 August 2023. If you are not already on the State Electoral Roll and meet the eligibility criteria, or if you have changed address recently, you must complete an enrolment form.

Electoral enrolment forms are available from the Shire of Toodyay, all post offices, all Australian Electoral Commission offices or the Western Australian Flectoral Commission and must be completed and reach a Divisional Returning Officer in Western Australia by 5:00 PM Friday, 25 August 2023.

Non-Resident Owners and Occupiers

If you are a non-resident owner or occupier of rateable property in the Shire of Toodyay and are on the State or Commonwealth Electoral Roll, you are eligible to enrol to vote. If you are not on the State or Commonwealth Electoral Roll and own or occupy rateable property in the Shire of Toodyay you may be eligible to enrol to vote. This applies if you were on the last electoral roll for the Shire of Toodyay prior to May 1996 and have owned or occupied rateable property in the district continuously since this time. Please contact your local government for details. Owners of land who were on the last Local Government roll continue to retain that status until they cease to own the rateable property to which the enrolment relates. Occupiers do not have continuous enrolment and should contact the Shire of Toodyay to confirm their enrolment status. To be eligible to enrol as an occupier, you will need to have a right of continuous occupation under a lease, tenancy agreement or other legal instrument for at least the next three months following the date of the application to enrol.

Joint Owners and Occupiers

If a rateable property is owned or occupied by more than two people, a majority of the owners/occupiers may nominate two persons from amongst themselves who are on either the State or Commonwealth Flectoral Roll, to enrol as owner/occupier electors.

A body corporate that owns or occupies rateable property may nominate two people who are on either the State or Commonwealth Electoral Roll to enrol as owner/occupier electors.

A grating and restless call

Bird of the Month Desraé Clarke

IT WAS a lovely surprise for a Toodyay Naturalists's Club member to report sighting a restless flycatcher (Myiagra inquieta) on her Toodyay property.

A community member also observed and identified this species, which has several common names including 'scissors grinder' for its continuous and rapid 'grating' call of 'chewe, chewe, cheweeee' when hunting for prey.

The species lives up to its 'restless' moniker as it is constantly moving, waving its closed tail, and flying after an insect or to a new perch.

It is widely distributed around Australia except in extremely arid areas.

It prefers open woodland and areas of swamp

Although it is found throughout the greater southwest of the state it is not common within

the Shire of Toodyay.

Nat's Club members had a weekend away in the vicinity of Bluff Knoll in the Stirling Ranges in 2018 where they heard and sighted several of this species.

The male bird has a metallic sheen on its dark blue-black crested head and a dark grey upper body with grey-brown wings and tail.

The under-body is entirely white.

The female is similarly coloured, without the sheen, and has a small, buff-coloured patch on the side of the white shoulder.

Flight is swooping and graceful.

The restless flycatcher has a distinctive habit

of hovering over branches, grass, and foliage, uttering its harsh, metallic call.

It is thought that the calling may disturb its prey, which include beetles, plant bugs, worms, ants, weevils, flies, moths, wasps and spiders.

The species is known as 'crepuscular' meaning active at dusk and/or at dawn.

Breeding is from July to January.

The male bird assists in building a neat, cupshaped nest on a horizontal branch that may be from 15 to 20m off the ground.

Made of shreds of bark, fine grasses, and held together with cobweb, the outside of the nest is camouflaged with spider's egg sacs and lichen.

The female lays three to four glossy, off-white eggs, with bands of purplish-brown and purple spotting around the larger end, with parents

The young fledge within 13 to 16 days.

Depending on the availability of prey, the restless flycatcher may have three broods in a

The sound of a frog changing gears

Python Watch

Desraé Clarke

THE HANDSOME motorbike frog or Western green tree frog has the scientific name (Litoria moorei).

This helps with identification as common names

can be rather confusing.

Female motorbike frogs are generally larger than the male, growing to a total length of 115mm compared with the 78mm male.

As its common name suggests, its call resembles a motorbike. It has a long, low growl that breaks several

times, resembling a machine changing gears. It is a common frog found wherever there are

swampy areas or household ponds and may be found beneath ground rubbish or bark on both

standing or fallen trees.

It is an easy species to identify, with either green or brown colouring together with darker green or brown patches.

A dark stripe is noted from the snout passing over the eye and through the ear (tympanum) towards the front limbs.

It has a triangular-shaped head and the ear-drum (tympanum) is large, round and visible.

This species is an efficient climber with its strong, long hind legs and large adhesive pads on the fingers and toes.

Eggs of this frog are laid in spring to late summer as a floating clump that may adhere to vegetation.

As is known, the egg develops to a tadpole and

then to a frog. This process is called metamorphosis and happens up to April as long as there is moisture

Its main diet consists of flies and mosquitoes that are snapped up with an extremely quick action of its long, slender tongue.

From little things big things grow

A JOYFUL surprise awaited Friends diligently weeding recently near the Pelham Brook outlet, the site of major environmental restoration work in 2019.

While undertaking their maintenance work they were happy to discover, hidden among the choking weeds, that far more of the previous year's plantings had survived than expected.

The seedlings had not only survived, but thrived.

The volunteers will continue to plant from trays of healthy plants raised by the Seed Group, and weeding around sedges planted over the previous two years.

This is all part of the Friends' ongoing care

for the area around the Pelham Brook Outlet behind the Anglican Church.

Sedges will feature in our next planting day in August, revegetating along Boyagerring Brook near the school.

The sedges were supplied by the Noongar Land Enterprise Group's "Boola Boonap" (place of many trees).

Two years ago the group purchased WA Farm Trees in Northam and is working towards producing 2.5 million seedlings a year for land restoration projects.

They will be a great source of riparian species for TFOR revegetation sites.

The Friends' next working bees are scheduled for Sunday and Monday August 13 and 14.

The Sunday revegetation task is to plant sedges along the Boyagerring Brook, with participants meeting at the school carpark at 9am.

The Monday group will meet at 9am behind St Stephen's Anglican Church.

The Avon Descent and Food Festival and Family Fun Day will have been held the previous Saturday.

The Monday group will survey the impact of the event at key access points on the Avon River within the Shire of Toodyay and clean up as needed.

Members of the community are most welcome to come along and join in the fun.

ONE THING I often find myself saying to family members, friends, and individuals through the work we do at Regional Men's Health is "look after yourself mate".

This message comes from a genuine place of concern for these people.

It encompasses a key component of our

It encompasses a key component of our vision statement "to empower men and communities to take responsibility for their wellbeing and health".

But what does it really mean for blokes living and working in regional, rural and remote WA?

Best described as "self-care", looking after yourself is a deliberate, self-initiated act to help maintain physical, mental, social or spiritual wellbeing.

Because we all live different lives, self-care will vary from person to person.

The circumstances around our work, family, individual capacity and environment can change.

However, for most of us it should be regular and ongoing, not just a one-off thing we do, then forget about it until next year. It should be more than just the time left

over, more than just the dregs.

Taking the time for our self-care is not a

luxury.

It is a necessity, and should form part of

our daily, weekly or monthly routine. It can help us better cope with challenging times and the demands of daily life.

For a lot of men, a "warrior attitude" to business goals and success can push wellbeing to the bottom of the list.

When we think about it, acts of self-care give us an opportunity to reset.

It can be a circuit breaker on the daily grind, a break from the rat race that life can often feel like.

This is especially the case in these fast-moving times of technological advancement, social media bombardment, and the 24/7 blurring of our work-life balance, for example working from home and being constantly available via our smartphones.

Relationships can become strained, we can suffer burn out, harbour resentment, and miss out on things we didn't know were important until too late.

Self-care offers us a buffer from the bumps in the road.

There is a range of definitions for self-care, all pointing towards making the time to do things on a regular basis, such as:

 Starting with small changes that we can manage. Ask what is within our control, and when we need to say 'no' to unhelpful habits, behaviours, or commitments;

- Changing our mindset and putting ourselves first. We shouldn't see this as selfish but as a form of good self-management. Actively plan and commit for self-care to happen;
- Being connected to our passions, interests and a sense of belonging to family and community;
- Eating well and exercising regularly, with a good sleep routine; and
- Getting a checkup with our GP and other health care professionals.

Remember, self-care starts with you, so try doing something that makes you feel good, gets you excited and puts a smile on your face.
