

## **Project Update**



#### **Toodyay DHS Site Visit**

It was a busy day at the Gonneville Project site when the Toodyay District High School Year 10 students visited. As part of the Australian Earth Science Education (AusEarthEd) Wheatbelt Engagement Program, Year 10 students had the opportunity to apply their classroom learning in the field. Hosted by Chalice Mining and supported by AusEarth Ed CEO, Jo Watkins, students were given a tour of the Project site and got the opportunity to participate in some hands-on activities.

The day started with the discovery story, understanding exploration methods used to discover the Gonneville deposit, then a rundown on project development studies, including the environmental approvals process. Students got the opportunity to do some water monitoring, understand flora surveys, recording plants in survey quadrants, see a drill rig and visit the core yard where they were able to log core. Chalice staff hosted and gave insight into the careers within the organisation and pathways to get into the various roles.

Shelly Maes, Toodyay District High School Pathways Coordinator and Deputy Principal said, 'Seeing the practical application of the things they have learnt about gives the students greater understanding and context to what they are studying at school. Information is easier to retain when it is relatable'.



#### How was Gonneville found?

Chalice's geologists discovered the Gonneville deposit in early 2020 after investigating publicly available geological data. The data showed promising geological features at the Gonneville location, consistent with an area that may contain minerals.

This prompted Chalice to apply for exploration tenements and complete further exploration activities. Initial drilling completed proved there are minerals at Gonneville, with the first drill hole samples showing high levels of nickel and palladium.

THE OLD proverb "God helps those who help themselves" is never more relevant than when we reach retirement age.

Four years ago, I retired and moved to Toodyay after more than 30 years of living in inner city Perth.

I wanted to get out of the city where I lived closely surrounded by other people, but knew very few of them.

When someone retires, becomes unemployed or unwell, a feeling of isolation can develop.

The big city can be insular and people have busy lives and mostly don't participate in local events or join clubs.

Interacting with other people and having a social life is important to maintain your mental and physical health.

I wanted to spend my retirement in a relaxed environment, hoping to make friends around my own age and participate in local clubs and events.

I have joined several clubs and connected with others in the local community.

Toodyay has provided what I was seeking and I'm hoping to live here for as long as my health and fitness will allow.

I read once that one of the biggest mistakes you can make as you age is believing you can still do everything you could do when you were young.

As the years pass I have noticed that my physical abilities have taken a downturn.

It is not so easy weeding the garden or cleaning the gutters

When I was told about the Staying In Place model operating in another country town and making a huge difference to the elderly in and around that town, I wanted to find out more, as it may be something I would need in the (hopefully distant) future.

As any local knows Toodyay has an ageing population and according to the 2021 census, the average age of the local population is higher than the WA average.



Planning ahead of time can help you stay in place in your own home and keep your independence.

I'm very happy to say that Staying in Place Toodyay Districts (SIPTD) is now up and running, joining many other regional communities who are now operating this successful model.

The Federal Government, after assessment, may provide an aged care package for individuals to support them to continue to live a comfortable life in their own home.

The difference in the SIPTD model is that it is a Toodyay based not-for-profit community organisation and is run by locals for locals.

The model aims to connect with seniors to determine their needs to remain safely in their own homes, while developing an ongoing support relationship.

Local Toodyay support workers are engaged as independent self-employed contractors, registered, certified and supported through the Mable job platform.

Services coordinated by SIPTD include cleaning, gardening, nursing assistance, help with shopping, transport to medical appointments, social support and meal delivery.

Providing employment for locals to help keep seniors socially connected and in their own homes keeps the revenue earned in the community which benefits local businesses and adds to the economic prosperity of Toodyay and surrounds.

Whether you already have an aged care package or think you may be eligible for one, or if you haven't come to terms that you are not coping as well as you used to with everyday tasks, please contact SIPTD for information and advice.

SIPTD thanks Rio Tinto for their grant in funding the purchase of medical equipment and the support provided by local Labor MP Darren West.





#### Friends join students in Landcare unit

Toodyay Friends of the River (TFOR)

TOODYAY Friends of the River have recently formed a partnership with Toodyay District High School focused on assisting students with a Landcare unit.

This partnership started when the group was approached by teacher Mark Donnelly about the possibility of working with a group of students on the practical component of the unit related to the river environment.

As a result of that approach TFOR members Bethan Lloyd and Greg Warburton are now helping with delivery of this landcare project to a group of 11 Year 9 students.

The project site is from the lower crossing of Boyagerring Brook up to where the brook leaves farmland and as the site basically wraps around the school it is conveniently close for practical activities.

So far, the students have set up salinity monitoring points at three sites to develop an understanding of salinity levels in Boyagerring Brook, and how these vary at different flow times.

They have also installed a camera trap to monitor animal movements and to date have captured (on film) a fox, a bronze wing pigeon and several fantails.

In another aspect of learning about the river ecosystem, students are measuring the survival and growth of native seedlings planted this winter, including during earlier TFOR busy bees.

The group is undertaking essential and never-ending weed control activities and is learning techniques such as using solarisation to smother weeds such as oxalis and veldt

Mark Donnelly said, "The highlight for many of the students was the woody weed removal with Greg Warburton."

In addition, they are tackling some larger weeds (that is something growing where you don't want it or where it is detrimental to the broader environment), cutting down and painting olive trees with glyphosate and injecting it into those trees too large to cut down.

The students are also learning the names of native species and weeds in the area and are pressing specimens to help with identification.

Future activities will include investigation of soil types and the collection, processing and sowing of native seeds, plus hopefully a bird watching walk.

Finally, safety when working outdoors is a major theme in the unit including sun protection, appropriate clothing and footwear, the use of gloves and being observant for potential risk factors.

Mark commented "Students have learned a lot about landcare aims and land management practices through the strong partnership we have formed with the Toodyay Friends of the River."

"They are always enthusiastic to take part in hands-on learning and are eager to attempt new tasks."

He added that, "It has been great to see young people regularly taking part in environmental activities and helping to maintain and improve the natural environment in the Toodyay shire."

It has been a great pleasure for TFOR working with these students, and we look forward to continuing in Term 4.

#### Weepy eyes indicate Bobtail flu

BOBTAIL goannas are being reported to us with the Bobtail Flu so keep a look out for these goannas as they come out of their winter brumation.

Affected bobtails present with classic flu-like symptoms such as weepy eyes, nasal discharge, oral discharge, increased sneezing, lethargy, and weight loss.

If we get these animals early with the correct treatments they can be cured and they will be released.

The virus is a death sentence for affected bobtails without human intervention.

Concerning marsupials, we have not received any joey kangaroos from local areas but we also support metropolitan based wildlife centres without 24 hour carers.

These groups tend to receive animals that are able to be cared for at the centres but marsupials require the 24 hour care we can provide, so we take them which was the case for three joeys last month.

A black gloved wallaby was handed into the Mundaring Veterinarian after the mother was hit by a car.

The vets contacted MMaP to take in and look after this endangered animal.

We are now full but will not turn away any injured or orphaned animals.







#### **Trapdoor spiders intrigue visitors**

THE WEATHER was kind for a recent club members' visit to the Minivale district within the Wheatbelt Shire of Dowerin.

The main interest for the excursion was the presence of Trapdoor Spiders.

The beautiful wildflowers were also a drawcard and we were not disappointed.

The displays of the delicate Featherflower (Verticordia) in colours of rich yellow and others of delicate rose-pink were exquisite.

There was a considerable display of a rich purple shrub of the Starflower, Calytrix.

The presence on the flowers of a small attractive bug was noted.

It had a yellow body with black stripes across it and a touch of red – a very attractive little critter.

Another splash of purple-blue colour was that of the Dampiera.

There were many extremely delicate tiny flowering plants that are so beautiful.

The mauve Fringed Lily climbs up anything available like a stick protruding from the ground, low shrubbery, etc..

Other small plants found were tiny cushions of brightly coloured Triggerplants dressed in a golden yellow with orange markings and a buttercup so small it could easily be passed by.

Two species of Poverty Bush, Eremophila, were found with one having mauve-coloured small flowers, which interest small birds with a short bill, and a second plant species of a long tubular flower that the honeyeater species favour.

There were several types of hakea with spectacular pink blossoms and grevilleas with large yellow flowers greatly sought after by native bees.

One of the Grevilleas has a small black flower and is known as the Toothbrush Grevillea.

#### **Red-capped Robin on Rottnest**

Bird of the Month Desraé Clarke

THE RED-CAPPED Robin is found across Australia in a great variety of habitats that range from eucalypt forests, woodlands, jam, mulga to home gardens.

Rottnest Island also has a small resident population.

The male is 11cm to 12cm with the female slightly smaller.

It has a brilliant red spot on its forehead in a jet-black cap and a matching brilliant red breast.

It has a white wing mark and white edges to the black tail with white flanks and underparts.

The female has a much paler cap and breast of a brick/red colour.

Its back is a buff/grey. The underparts are a dull white with white edges to the tail.

The Red-capped Robin watches silently from a perch ready to pounce on its prey of moths, beetles, wasps, ants or flies; it returns to its perch to consume its catch.

Breeding takes place between July and January.

The tiny nest, built entirely by the female, consists of soft grasses, bark and spider webs in the fork of a horizontal branch from one to three metres from the ground.

It may be re-used again in the same season if there is a second clutch.

Two to four blue or grey/green eggs are laid and incubated by the female for about fourteen days.

Both parents feed the nestlings who fledge within fourteen days with the parents continuing to feed the young for approximately three weeks following fledging.

If the bird is disturbed in the vicinity of its nest it will give rasping clicks and it will repeatedly flick its wings.

The call of the Red-capped Robin is a low, bubbling sound 'dit-dit-drrrr-it' resembling the call of the telephone.

It is a bird found within the Shire of Toodyay.

#### Secret garden glistens between showers

Legless local may be a lizard after all

IT WAS a very cold and wet Thursday for our Garden Club visit to Russty and Liz Tayler's Coondle property this month.

After a cancellation just a week before this visit, our members were thankful and appreciative that Russty and Liz stepped in to host the event at short notice.

The garden was looking just beautiful in between frequent showers.

#### "It's how you react that matters"

THERE once was a bloke named Epictetus who was born into slavery and then became a famous Stoic thinker.

Back in his day which was over 2000 years ago he had the radical thought that, "It's not what happens to you, but how you react to it that matters".

I use the word "radical" deliberately as in the society in which Epictetus strutted his toga (jeans hadn't been invented yet) many citizens felt that life was at the whim of the Greek gods and goddesses they worshipped.

And that a lightning bolt could come down from Mount Olympus at any moment to strike the unworthy or just be hurled downwards when god whats-his-name was bored.

Epictetus's quote goes to personal agency and its meaning is just as important now in 2024 as it was back then.

In effect what his quote says is we have choices concerning how we respond to an event.

We are not mindless automatons that just have a "click-whirr" response although much of the behaviour we see around us might suggest otherwise.

Yes, perhaps there are robots living

amongst us (joking, of course).

Or as Viktor Frankl said, "Between stimulus and response there is a space.

"In that space is our power to choose our

"In our response lies our growth and our freedom."

He should know, having survived three years in Nazi concentration camps, where his parents and wife perished.

After surviving hellholes such as Auschwitz, and after liberation from the Nazis he returned to his medical work (he was a psychiatrist).

Nowadays he is perhaps best known as the author of Man's Search for Meaning.

His 1946 book chronicles his time as a camp prisoner and builds on his observation that those who survived the camps were able to connect with a purpose in life.

It's not a stretch to state that having a life purpose can help one push through challenges.

When these challenges hit you perhaps it's also worth searching for that space between the stimulus (or event) and response.

In that space you choose how you want to

And I reckon that's a pretty good thing.

IN MAY this year the alliance met with local State Labor MP Darren West, at Parliament House to present him with the petition to have Julimar State Forest reclassified as a

The petition was forwarded to the Standing Committee for the Environment and Public

Minister for the Environment, Mr Reece Whitby, for his opinion and recommendation.

Disappointingly the Minister did not support the proposal, rejecting the opportunity to protect one of the last remaining Jarrah-Wandoo forests north of Perth and made the

Agreement ML1SA granted to Alcoa under the Alumina Refinery Agreement Act 1961 covers

What management is in place for the critically endangered Woylie and the vulnerable Chuditch?

The Julimar Chuditch is currently breeding successfully and supporting the reestablishment of other populations of Chuditch around WA and SA.

How is one of the two largest breeding grounds for the Carnaby's Black Cockatoo being protected to support these iconic birds who have seen a significant decline in recent years and are now deemed endangered?

There is high public interest in Julimar and surrounds with over 700 people petitioning the Environmental Protection Authority to conduct the highest possible environmental assessment over the Chalice Mining proposal which abuts the forest.

The WA Forest Alliance has also slammed Minister Whitby's decision.

WAFA senior campaigner, Jason Fowler, said, "Despite Julimar forest ticking all the boxes for conservation status and being proposed as a conservation park since 1994, Minister Whitby omits this fact from his response, ignoring his own department's forest management plan and capitulating to mining interests".

Fowler adds "There is a serious risk that the Cook government's commitment to finally implement over 200,000ha of already proposed protected areas like Julimar will fail".

In addition, the WA Government is committed to creating 400,000ha of new conservation areas in the southwest.

Mature ecosystems like those found in Julimar forest cannot be replaced, they rely on the geodiversity and biodiversity which has evolved over many thousands of years and once destroyed cannot be replicated.

#### Walking the dog reduces dementia

DID YOU know that the latest studies have shown that exercising old dogs can reduce their risk of doggy dementia?

Yes, dogs get dementia too.

Now you may be asking yourself "What is doggy dementia?" and "How can we treat it?"

Doggy dementia (Canine cognitive dysfunction) is similar to Alzheimer's disease in humans.

It normally occurs in dogs older than eight years but they can be as young as six years old.

It is a disease of the brain that comes with changes mostly attributed to ageing.

For example, dogs with dementia may get stuck behind furniture or forget where they are in the backyard.

They may sleep more and even become grumpy toward humans and other dogs.

They may pace at night and whine or bark without purpose.

How do we as vets diagnose doggy dementia?

This disease is hard to diagnose as there is no accurate, non-invasive test for it.

Like humans, dogs may have other diseases that can make a diagnosis complex and difficult to notice.

What can I do to reduce my dog's risk?



An elderly dog may develop Doggy dementia.

There is recent research into exercise and 'brain training' to reduce the risk of dementia.

Things that are good for keeping your dog's brain active and engaged are toys that stimulate your dog to think about getting rewards or taking your dog for regular walks.

There are even special diets that can help your dog's brain.

What do I do if I think my dog has dementia?

The best thing to do is to contact your local vet to discuss your concerns around this topic.

Your vet may prescribe medications that can help reduce the signs or slow the disease and they may even give you tips and tricks to keep your dog's brain active.

Unfortunately, there is no cure for dementia but caring for a dog with dementia is very rewarding and we can make a significant difference to their quality of life.


